“IN LIGHT OF MARX’S WORDS, IT’S WORTH EXPLORING ‘the historical development of this class struggle’ as seen from the perspective of the classical liberals. At first this analysis of class may seem paradoxical. Free-market advocates have long emphasized that trade brings increasingly elaborate forms social cooperation through the division of labor and free exchange. As Ludwig von Mises pointed out, the realization that specialization and trade allow unlimited mutual benefits induces people to put aside their differences and to cooperate in the productive process. How could the classical liberals of the early nineteenth century have been interested in class struggle . . .?”

**Sheldon Richman** is a contemporary left-libertarian writer, speaker, and editor of the Future of Freedom Foundation’s *Future of Freedom*, currently living near Little Rock, Arkansas. Richman also spent over a decade as editor of *The Freeman: Ideas on Liberty*, from the late 1990s to 2012; during his tenure the magazine became one of the most important print outlets for left-wing market anarchist writing, publishing key essays by writers such as Kevin Carson, Joseph Stromberg, and Charles Johnson, as well as important articles from his own pen. He is the author of three books, a Senior Fellow at the Future of Freedom Foundation and a Research Fellow at the Independent Institute.
